#### **Cirencester Choral Society 1863-2013**

Cirencester Choral Society was founded in 1863 and has this year been celebrating its 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The highlights of its history include a concert in 1905 conducted by Sir Hubert Parry, the services of three illustrious patrons in the postwar decades (*see notes beneath the texts of the audience carols*) and having as its conductor in 1959-60 Peter Maxwell Davies, now Master of the Queen's Music. Today, under Carleton Etherington's direction, the Society has a full membership of



over 120. This encourages near-capacity audiences and the finances needed to engage professional musicians for all our main concerts. Orchestral players are assembled by our accompanist Jenny Rees. We engage postgraduate student singers from London's Guildhall School of Music and Drama for most of the solo roles in the works perform.

#### Special events were held in 2013 to mark the Society's anniversary, including:

- a rare performance of Parry's *Invocation to Music*, which proved to be a revelation to audience and performers alike. In the words of our reviewer: "Carleton Etherington took us on a journey of discovery, giving some neglected, yet magnificent, music by an eminent son of Gloucestershire the kind of performance it really deserves."
- an open workshop in which some 70 singers from across the south joined a similar number from CCS to rehearse and give a free informal concert of Vivaldi's *Gloria* and *Magnificat*, under the expert leadership of Ralph Allwood, former Director of Music at Eton College;



- an Anniversary Public Lecture on the prevailing movements for change in the form of Anglican worship in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, especially the role of music, and how this led indirectly to the formation of our own and many other choral societies;
- a performance of *Elijah* in November, rated "a triumph" by our reviewer, the work being chosen to recognise the hugely important role that Mendelssohn's choral music played in the early life of the Society.

#### **Fundraising for charities**

In recent years, in addition to carol singing, the Society has put on several Christmas concerts to raise funds for other charities – Save the Children, the Acorns children's hospice, and the campaign for restoration of the Town Hall (this church's south porch). Tonight's concert for Churn follows the introduction earlier this year of a mutually beneficial association between the Society and Churn in which Churn provides and benefits from the sale of interval refreshments at our main concerts.

All profits from this evening's concert will go to The Churn Project.

#### This evening's visiting performers:

**Katie** Etherington (soprano) grew up in Brentwood, Essex and studied both voice and flute for her music degree at Surrey University. Having worked as a teacher, most recently at Dean Close Preparatory School, Cheltenham, Katie now spends the majority of her time being mum to her two children, Hannah and John, and is also training for Reader ministry in the Church of England. Katie has appeared as a soloist in a range of repertoire, including Vivaldi's Gloria, Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Requiem and Coronation Mass, Mendelssohn's Elijah, Fauré's Requiem, Rutter's Magnificat and numerous other works.

**Judith Paris** (*narrator*) Judith was born in Cirencester and was a member of Cirencester Ballet Club, winning a scholarship to the Royal Ballet School. She has been a member of the National Theatre, the Royal Shakespeare Company and has performed many times in London's West End. She made eight films with Ken Russell, has appeared in a variety of TV productions from Lynda La Plante's *Mind Games* and *A Touch of Frost* to *Dr Who* and *The Two Ronnies*. Judith's mother was the pianist Doris Franklin, Cirencester Choral Society 's accompanist for many years. In 2011 Judith performed her one woman show *Waxing Lyrical* - the story of Mme Tussaud - in Cirencester Parish Church.

**David Whitehead** (*organist*) studied at the Royal College of Music in London where he was Organ Scholar at St Paul's Cathedral, before embarking upon a teaching and performing career. Over the years he has taught in a wide variety of schools, from London across to Gloucestershire, and his conducting and performing career has encompassed involvement with many church & school choirs, chamber choirs, and choral societies, including Cirencester CS from 2001-4. Alongside his teaching he has maintained a career as an established recitalist and répétiteur and has worked as an accompanist with a range of choirs.

The tune for 'O come, O come Emmanuel' was adapted from a traditional French tune by Rev Thomas Helmore and introduced to many parts of the UK by his brother, Frederick Helmore, the 'Musical Missionary' and founder of Cirencester Choral Society in 1863.
