# Cirencester Choral Society's Fundraising

In addition to the annual programme of two main concerts per year in early May and late November/early December, Cirencester Choral Society has in recent years put on several Christmas concerts to raise funds for other charities – Save the Children, the Acorns Children's Hospice, the Campaign for Cirencester Parish Church to restore the south porch and, in our 150th Anniversary year in 2013, the Churn Project. All profits from tonight's concert will be go to Cirencester Housing for Young People (CHYP). Our annual carol singing for charity at Cirencester's Waitrose store last Saturday was also in support of CHYP.

# Notes on tonight's concert programme

We are delighted to welcome the recorder consort *Major Pipework* to perform with us tonight and to welcome back Judith Paris who entertained us with her readings in 2013. We are very grateful to them for generously giving their time to support CHYP and we thank all our audience for attending tonight and supporting this deserving local charity.

In addition to well-known carol favourites, we will be asking you to play your part in singing *My Guardian Angel* by Judith Weir, who succeeded Sir Peter Maxwell Davies as Master of the Queens Music last year. The carol was first performed at the Spitalfields Festival in 1997 and written especially for audience participation. Carleton will teach you your part, but if you have a moment and want to steel a march on your neighbour, have a look at the music reproduced in this programme!

This year saw the death, at 95, of Sir David Willcocks and the 70<sup>th</sup> birthday of John Rutter. These two giants of choral composition have shaped the Christmas musical landscape of the past 50–60 years through their arrangements of traditional carols and the writing of new ones. The programme tonight includes several of their arrangements, as no doubt will carol services and concerts across the nation in recognition their huge contribution.

Two works new to our seasonal repertoire include our opening carol by a less well-known British choral composer of the previous generation. Haldane Stewart was organist and choirmaster at Magdalen College Oxford throughout the interwar years. *On this day* is the best known of his modest output, exhibiting his liking for fluctuating time signatures to suit the rhythm and metre of the text. In contrast, the name of Johann Pachelbel is very familiar today, but unfortunately only through the popularity of his *Canon in D*. In his day – the second half of the 17<sup>th</sup> century – his extensive musical output was widely admired, particularly his organ and choral works. The *Magnificat* (the Virgin Mary's song of praise to God) that we sing tonight is one of no less than 13 settings of this canticle that Pachelbel composed.

The seasonal items chosen by *Major Pipework* span the centuries and the continents and bring a truly international flavour to our music making.

# Tonight's performers

Carleton Etherington (conductor) has been the Musical Director of Cirencester Choral Society since January 2005. He is Organist and Director of Music at Tewkesbury Abbey and combines that post with teaching and performing. He also conducts Pershore Choral. Carleton was educated at Chetham's School of Music and the Royal Academy of Music. In 1992 he won first prize at the Paisley International Organ Competition and, the following year, the Royal College of Organists' "Performer of the Year" competition. He held posts at St Bride's Fleet Street and Leeds Parish Church before taking up his present appointment in 1996. Carleton has performed throughout Europe, Australia and the USA and has won considerable acclaim for his CD recordings, both as soloist and accompanist. He frequently broadcasts on Radio 3's Choral Evensong and, in 2010, conducted the live Christmas morning BBC1 TV broadcast from Tewkesbury. Carleton lives in Tewkesbury with his wife, Katie, and their two young children, Hannah and John.

# Major Pipework (recorder consort)

Major Pipework was formed in 2002. Under the musical direction of Terry Hobbs, they are all amateurs and members of the Cheltenham and Gloucester branch of the Society of Recorder Players. Playing many types of music ranging from the 15th century to the present, their performances have raised funds to help with the maintenance of several churches and National Trust properties and for various charities. They aim to bring the pleasures of the recorder to a wider audience and you can usually see and hear at least 5 different types: Descant, Treble, Tenor, Bass and Great Bass. The small Sopranino or huge Contra bass may occasionally appear. After the performance you are most welcome to come and have a closer look!

**Judith Paris** (*narrator*) Judith was born in Cirencester and was a member of Cirencester Ballet Club, winning a scholarship to the Royal Ballet School. She has been a member of the National Theatre, the Royal Shakespeare Company and has performed many times in London's West End. She made eight films with Ken Russell, has appeared in a variety of TV productions from Lynda La Plante's *Mind Games* and *A Touch of Frost* to *Dr Who* and *The Two Ronnies*. Judith's mother was the pianist Doris Franklin, Cirencester Choral Society 's accompanist for many years. In 2011 Judith performed her one woman show *Waxing Lyrical* - the story of Mme Tussaud - in Cirencester Parish Church.

**David Whitehead** (*organist*) studied at the Royal College of Music in London where he was Organ Scholar at St Paul's Cathedral, before embarking upon a teaching and performing career. Over the years he has taught in a wide variety of schools, from London across to Gloucestershire, and his conducting and performing career has encompassed involvement with many church & school choirs, chamber choirs, and choral societies, including Cirencester CS from 2001-4. Alongside his teaching he has maintained a career as an established recitalist and répétiteur and has worked as an accompanist with a range of choirs.

# **Cirencester Housing for Young People (CHYP)**

CHYP was established in 1986 to help vulnerable young homeless people, aged 16 to 25, in and around the Cirencester area. CHYP provides stable housing with support services to enable its residents to develop independent living skills and realise their full potential.

No young person is homeless without something going seriously wrong in their life at some point. Each has his or her own unique set of problems requiring individual attention. Most importantly they need somebody they can trust and rely on, often for the first time in their lives. That's where CHYP comes in.

There are increasing numbers of homeless young people, particularly in the 16-18 year age group due to the rising number of family breakdowns and those leaving care aged 16 who are unprepared for independent living. Since 1986 CHYP has helped over 500 young people and has demonstrated that intensive support at this early stage can improve the life skills and employability of these young people, preventing the slide back into homelessness and benefit dependency.

Each client has a dedicated key worker who works closely with them to identify their support needs. Staffed 24 hours a day, CHYP's house at Querns Lane provides a high level of support for seven young people. During their stay the residents will learn how to look after themselves and start preparing for life in their own home. Help is given with life skills from self care, cooking and laundry, to literacy, numeracy and budgeting. Their key worker is also there to provide crucial emotional support. As residents become more confident and their skills grow, they are moved to the "next steps" accommodation in Ashcroft Road which houses four people. Here the level of support is lower as residents are encouraged to learn to become more independent. CHYP works with them to locate appropriate further education, work experience or training placements leading to employment and eventually to independent living.

However, the help offered does not stop when a young person moves into their own home since floating support continues. Many young people who were helped in the early days of the charity still maintain contact from time to time. For many young people CHYP is the nearest thing they have to a family.
